

SPECIFIC CHARGE 2023 - 2024

- 1. Develop educational guidance for students aimed toward supporting an academic environment in which faculty may be presenting and discussing content that students find uncomfortable.
- 2. Develop best administrative practices for faculty responses to student objections to course content, with consideration made regarding University procedures and resources that tend to support or challenge faculty academic freedom.
- 3. In collaboration with SACUA, continue pursuing such further work related to the AAAC 2022-2023 recommendations regarding SPG reviews and revisions related to disability and illnesses, with consideration of the following SPGs:
 - a. 201.12 Discipline
 - b. 201.15 Fitness for Duty
 - c. 201.15-01 Temporary Removal of Faculty for Lack of Fitness for Duty
 - d. 201.11-1 Sick Leave Plan—Academic Appointments
- 4. Assess current practices regarding disability support for faculty and staff, and provide recommendations regarding improvement.
- 5. Brainstorm on a potential symposium or invited speaker event focused on research around faculty burnout, including defining "burnout," identifying root causes, and policies and procedures to prevent burnout—with planning, logistical, and financial assistance from the Faculty Senate Office.
- 6. Consider with the Provost any further issues or topics brought forward by the AAAC committee members or the Provost for discussion over the course of the year. While coordinating with the Faculty Senate Office to help avoid duplicating

SPECIFIC CHARGE 2023 – 2024

- 1. Review the use of AI in the prior year's survey of administrators, and develop recommendations regarding the continued use of AI to summarize survey results.
- 2. Develop a document clearly describing to the Faculty Senate members a mechanism put in place to ensure the following:
 - a. anonymity of the answers to the quantitative questions of the annual AEC survey;
 - b. anonymity of the free form advice to the administrators of the survey;
 - c. confidentiality of the remarks to the administrators included in the survey.
- 3. Consider further improvements to the survey, such as the following:
 - a. Simplify both processes of survey completion (data input by faculty) and survey interpretation (result consumption by academic administrators)
 - b. Continuing the efforts with ITS of incorporating all Department Chairs without Regental approval into the list of evaluated administrators.
 - c. Work with ITS to improve the admin-user-interface, which is currently very clunky and awkward to navigate (it's impossible to read, text is presented as low-res rasterized images, the overall look-and-feel of the input and output of AEC survey can be significantly improved.
 - d. Enhancing HR data for the 2024 survey for regional campuses:
 - i. HR data from Flint could be expanded to include all governing faculty at Flint as respondents.
 - ii. At Dearborn, it was recommended that units be consulted, if possible, in gathering HR data since the definition of governing faculty varies by unit.



- 3. Receive and review feedback about the accommodation process that the Faculty Senate Office will be soliciting from the Faculty Senate membership. Consolidate that feedback to share with the leadership of Student Accessibility and Accommodations Services (SAAS) and the Services for Students with Disabilities (SSD) office. Meet with SAAS and SSD leadership to discuss specific faculty concerns, and then report back to SACUA any relevant information obtained or recommendations developed.
- 4. Consider emergent issues or topics brought forward by SRAC committee members or the Vice President for Student Life for discussion over the course of the year. While coordinating with the Faculty Senate Office to help avoid duplicating work that SACUA has now referred to itself or to another committee, the committee may also continue discussing any issues or topics raised in the committee's most recent annual committee report.
